
## MHDC & HISTORIC BUILDING MARKER

The Historic Building Marker is an award for restoring or maintaining the remarkable architectural past of Mobile. It denotes buildings that contribute to the City's unique character and history, and honors the owners of the property.

To receive a marker, a building must be at least 75 years of age, have retained its original architectural character, and be well maintained. The marker consists of two separate pieces-the shield and the banner. The shield design represents the six flags that have flown over Mobile: French, Spanish, English, Republic of Alabama, Confederate States of America and the United States of America. The banner indicates the names of the original and current owners and construction date. The City takes special pride in the buildings marked with this unique symbol.

This grand American Foursquare style house has recently been renovated.




Deborah & Claire Taylor-Davis 204 Tuttle Avenue




#### Oakleigh Garden Historic District

This modest Creole Cottage was recently renovated and now really "pops."




T. Ryan McKee 1011 Augusta Street

This elegant two story home is notable for its cast iron verandahs.




Roy & Debra Isbell 910 Government Street

This early Craftsman style house displays a beetling hip roof dormer and wide eaves.




William and Susan Case 1214 Selma Street

This is one of the finest frame Italianate style residences in the city.

This big Bungalow features a wide front gable and battered columns supporting its attached roof.

This charming Bungalow displays clapboarded plinths and paired columns.




Lawrence and Elizabeth Hargett 1607 Monterey Place
