GLOSSARY

Homelessness Prevention: An intervention strategy designed to help families and individuals regain stability by providing financial assistance, such as, medium or short-term rental and utility assistance and stabilization services. (24 CFR 576.103)

Rapid Re-Housing: A solution to homelessness designed to help individuals and families quickly exit homelessness and return to permanent housing by providing short-term rental assistance and stabilization services to increase self-sufficiency and remain housed. (24 CFR 576.104)

Shelter: Any facility, the primary purpose of which is to provide a temporary shelter for specific populations experiencing a crisis such as, homelessness or domestic abuse, and which does not require occupants to sign leases or occupancy agreements. (24 CFR 576.102)

Stabilizations Services: Intensive short-term help that involves a consultation, assessment, and assistance with coping skills, educational resources, skills training, and other services that will help families and individuals gain and retain stability.

Transitional Housing: Supportive-yet temporary housing that provides relief from a crisis, such as homelessness or domestic abuse before transitioning into permanent housing. Generally offered for a limited period of time (can range from a few weeks to years — usually no more than two years).



- Provide a copy of payroll history
- Company must be located in the Incorporated City of Mobile Limits

Possible Loan Forgiveness Requirements:

- Contractor proof of actively bidding and seeking work
- Provide proof of accepted bid estimates and/or proposals or successfully entering into a contract on a project
- Proof of completion of at least 3 business development courses/workshop in business management, bid estimating, construction safety and contract negotiation. (Completed within 6 to 12 months of receiving the loan)




- The decedent must have died in Mobile County.
- Unless prohibited by religious statute, the decedent will be cremated.
- Next of kin include the surviving spouse, parent(s), adult children, and adult siblings.
- The County does not provide for subsidization of privately arranged funerals.
- The decedent and next of kin cannot own real property in Mobile County.
- The County bases eligibility on federal property guidelines. Insurance, income, property, and assets will be reviewed to determine eligibility.
- Lack of life insurance or burial policy does not constitute indigence. A
 decedent who has a prepaid burial plan, burial plot, or burial insurance
 benefits is not eligible for an indigent burial.

BUILD A BASIC DISASTER KIT

IN PREPARATION FOR HURRICANE SEASON

Water (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)
Food (at least a several-day supply of non-perishable food)
Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
Flashlight
First aid kit
Extra batteries
Whistle (to signal for help)
Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
Manual can opener (for food)
Local maps
Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery



BUILD A KIT FOR YOUR PET

IN PREPARATION FOR HURRICANE SEASON

FOOD - Keep several days' supply of food in an airtight, waterproof container.
WATER - Store a water bowl and several days' supply of water.
MEDICINE - Keep an extra supply of the medicine your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container.
FIRST AID KIT - Talk to your veterinarian about what is most appropriate for your pet's emergency medical needs.
COLLAR WITH ID TAG AND A HARNESS OR LEASH - Include a backup leash, collar and ID tag. Have copies of your pet's registration information and other relevant documents in a waterproof container and available electronically.
TRAVELING BAG, CRATE OR STURDY CARRIER - Ideally one for each pet.
GROOMING ITEMS - Pet shampoo, conditioner and other items, in case your pet needs some cleaning up.
SANITATION NEEDS - Include pet litter and litter box (if appropriate), newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs.
A PICTURE OF YOU AND YOUR PET TOGETHER - If you become separated from your pet during an emergency, a picture of you and your pet together will help you document ownership and allow others to assist you in identifying your pet.
FAMILIAR ITEMS - Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit. Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.

Masks (for everyone ages 2 and above), soap, hand sanitizer, disinfecting wipes to disinfect surfaces
Prescription medications. About half of all Americans take a prescription medicine every day. An emergency can make it difficult for them to refill their prescription or to find an open pharmacy. Organize and protect your prescriptions, over-the-counter drugs, and vitamins to prepare for an emergency.



- Open up your home to a pet in need for at least 2 weeks.
- Provide basic care for your foster pet by feeding, socializing, cleaning, and playing with them.
- Administer routine flea prevention, deworming, and/or any prescribed medication as directed by the shelter's Foster or Medical Coordinator.
- Attend scheduled follow-up appointments and routine check ups.
- Post your pet on social media and help them get adopted!




